Matthew 25:23

When I arrived at South Church in February 2006, the children and youth ministries were not a “stellar” part of our church. We were blessed to have several faithful Sunday School teachers, as well as **Lynn Robertson** who was leading our youth group at the time, but it was clear that we were struggling. There had been little to no growth in years, and no one could tell me when was the last time we held a Vacation Bible School during the summer.

Planting seeds in children when they are young is vital to their development as Christians. In his 2016 book, *Transforming Children into Spiritual Champions: Why Children Should Be Your Church's #1 Priority*, pollster and market researcher



Dr. George Barna wrote, “A series of studies were conducted regarding the age at which people accept Christ as their Savior highlights the importance of having people invite Jesus into their hearts as their Savior when they are young. We discovered that the probability of someone embracing Jesus as his or her Savior was 32 percent for those between the ages of 5 and 12; 4 percent for those in the 13 to 18 age range; and 6 percent for people 19 or older. In other words, if people do not embrace Jesus Christ as their Savior before they reach their teenage years, the chances of their doing so at all is slim.”

## More Interesting Puritan (Congregationalist) Facts



- The prominent 20th century American journalist and cultural critic, H. L. Mencken once observed, wrongly, “Puritanism is the haunting fear that someone, somewhere, may be happy.” On the contrary, Puritans read good books and enjoyed music. They drank beer with meals and rum at weddings. Puritans swam and skated, hunted and fished, and played at archery and bowling (as long as the games were not in a public tavern or on Sunday).
- The famous “Pilgrims” who landed at Plymouth Rock in 1620 were so radical they were usually disliked and sometimes hated. Unlike most Puritans, they did not seek to reform the Church of England; they thought the church was beyond help.
- Congregationalists did not work or play on Sunday. Women cooked the day before. Sunday morning, the whole family was ready. At eight o’clock, they heard the sound of a drum. This was the signal to go to church. They all marched up the hill to the fort. Sometimes the minister talked for more than three hours! Later, they went home to rest. In the afternoons, it was back to church for more! It was also a rule that men were required to bring their guns with them to church in case of an attack.

## NAPF/HOPE Conference

Off to San Diego we go...

Have you ever heard the phrase **“A great parking space can totally move you to tears”** when referring to California? Keep that thought in mind.

This year’s speaker’s name was **Nate Landis**. These are the lessons that we talked and heard about before breaking up into small groups to delve further with the youth.

In the first session, he referenced **Psalm 139**. David says in this Psalm that he wants to teach us about the end. He says, “Teach me to count my days so my days will count.” We’re in charge of our own life, birth, or death. David also asks, “What’s the purpose of life, if it’s only going to be taken away at the end?” David was able to accomplish everything he was supposed to in his life. God saved you *from* something, He saved you *for* something. At the end of the first session, Nate asked, “Are you going to leave the conference at the end of the week empty?”

In our second session, we learned that we are made in the image of God. We have the power to talk and create words. Words have the power to steer us in the right or wrong direction. We sow our seeds and our words reveal our hearts. Nate also taught us that we have to change our heart in order to change our words. All we need is 20 seconds of outrageous courage to change someone’s life for good. We can refresh others by refreshing them with fresh water.

Sunday’s night session was based on **John 11:33-44**. The question was, what does the face of Jesus look like? Jesus cried for us. He wants to roll the stone away, so He can fix and help us. We let Him in when the stone is rolled away. Christ lives in us and calls us by name. He wants to unwrap us and clothe us with the fruit of the spirit. The power of Christ is in us. Was Jesus crying about a parking spot, too?

Monday’s night session came from **Exodus 20**. Jesus took the penalty for us. He is sinless and never messes up. He wants to give us a perfect report card. He exchanges our sins for His perfectness. God is willing to throw out our charges, we are free. We have two choices in life - *His rules or ours*. He does not know our sin, He knows our name. In **Romans 8**, it says how He is jealous for our life. Jesus paid for our charges.

On Tuesday night, Nate taught from **Matthew 18:10-14**, the parable of the lost sheep. Jesus felt love for us the first time He saw us, that happened right from the start. God told us that we matter. Anytime we are separated from Christ, He misses us. If we are lost, we are noticed as missing. We are not complete with someone or something missing. Getting to Jesus is the most critical journey in life. It is hard to be mad at God since He paid and paved the way for us. Jesus has left us here on purpose and that reason is that we still need to help someone. We have a choice whether or not we want to go back to Him. He wants us to come home because He loves us. There is more rejoicing in heaven when we come home. There is also rejoicing when we find a place to park!

Our last session was based on **Matthew 18:5**. We know what God wants. We need to go to God, He is a perfect parent. We need the love of God, that is how we were made. God is always running after us to keep us safe. He will never play games with our soul. He tells us not to give up on our prayers. Do we trust ourselves enough to go in front of Him? We belong to Him. We have to accept something that God has paid for. We can’t get enough of Him. We tell Him, “Do it again!” “One more!” Do you ever hear a congregation tell the pastor, “One more time! Do it again!” after a sermon? (Nate’s words, not mine!)

Moving on...

Our mission work happened over the course of two and a half days. We first met up with the adults at their conference site. We learned about a non-profit called “Sole Hope.” Here is a little about the organization:

*Thousands of children in Uganda suffer from a crippling foot parasite called jiggers. Jiggers keep kids from going to school, running, and playing. They prevent people from walking and working. People with jiggers often become outcasts. This small parasite negatively impacts every aspect of a person’s life. Jiggers are treated by slicing open the skin with a sharp razor and removing the egg sack from the host. It’s a quick step repeated hundreds or thousands of times on a person’s body until they are 100% jigger-free. We address false beliefs commonly taught that jiggers are a “curse,” and show them they do not have to live this way. Jiggers may feel like a curse to the person affected, but there is another way! To help with this problem, you receive a shoe kit with all the necessities and instructions. You then have a Sole Hope Shoe Cutting Party. Once all the steps have been completed, you send them to the office in NC and they ship them off to Uganda.*

On the mission days we had for the youth conference, we were split into three groups. One group went to Jacobs and Cushman food pantry. They packaged 13,000 pounds of apples and plums. They also had to pluck snails from the plums. This food pantry goes through 370,000 pounds of food each month in San Diego county.

The second group went to San Dieguito County Park. This park offers a variety of recreational activities including five miles of hiking trails, five playgrounds, a basketball court, a wedding gazebo, pavilions and picnic areas, and BBQs. Our group did weeding and trimming on the grounds.

The third group went to a demo site. There they painted a tiled a bathroom. They also plastered ceilings. There was landscaping that was done. The palm trees were also trimmed.

Remember the question I asked at the beginning of the article? On the way to the van on the last day of missions, we get to the van and there is a nice \$65.00 ticket on the windshield. One had been placed on our other rental van as well. We were parked where we had permission and the university still issued the ticket. Needless to say, the conference leaders were not too pleased. They were probably moved to tears.

I was also able to attend a couple sessions of the adult conference. The first session I went to, the speaker said that it is the weak that are the best witnesses. We have to look at one another and love one another. We have to be a witness to Jesus Christ. The speaker also said that you can have a ministry at bars and clubs because that is where the people are. Any suggestions?

The second day I was able to go to the adult conference, I attended a workshop with three speakers. The title of the workshop was "What's Working at My Church?" Here are just a few key points from that workshop. One pastor suggested that you have a "Dinner for 8ish." This is so that the crowd is not too big or too small. You can have potlucks and rotate hosts and/or guests. Another pastor suggested that if there was a creative and talented group in the church, they could make prayer shawls and they also said that making chemo caps was a huge asset to the church and community. The third pastor talked about guests in the church. We have to gather their information. Once that is done, put it in the database and follow through and keep track of them. We have to focus on Mission and Ministry, not Membership.

The last day we were able to spend some time at the beach. It took both vans at least twenty minutes to keep circling the neighborhood and parking lots to find a spot to park. I am sure that they were moved to tears at that time, too.

There were also tears of awe and inspiration as we closed with communion at sunset. It was a beautiful sight and a wonderful way to come to a close.

Susanna Whiting was the wife of our first minister the Reverend John Whiting. This award would be for a female adult whose faithful service should be recognized.
