


From the Pastor's Pen

I know it is hard to believe, but guess what? There are about fifty-five days until Christmas! Every year it seems we say the same thing, "Where did the summer go?" Hey, I sometimes wonder where the last forty years went. Nonetheless, rather than



lamenting what was, how about we get excited about what is to come? First, we will enjoy our little ones all dressed up in costumes for our Phenomenally Fun Fall Family Franken-Festival! Then we gather with family and friends to celebrate Thanksgiving. Congratulations Grace Academy!

Fanny Crosby

The next hymn writer we are highlighting, after Charles Wesley, is Fanny Crosby (1820-1915). Francis Jane Crosby was blinded by an illness as an infant, but she lived a long life full of joy and accomplishment. She entered the New York School for the Blind at age 15, and remained there for 35 years, first as a student and then as a teacher.

She wrote poetry from the time that she was a child, and published her first book of poetry, *A Blind Girl and Other Poems*, at age 24. However, Fanny Crosby is best known for her hymns. She wrote more than 9000 hymns during her lifetime. Many, such as “All the Way My Savior Leads Me,” and “Blessed Assurance,” quickly became standards -- and are still included in many hymnals a century after her death.

Miss Crosby could write very complex hymns and compose music with a more classical structure (she could even improvise it), but she preferred to write simple, sentimental verses that could be used for evangelism. She continued to write her poetry up to her death, a month shy of her ninety-fifth birthday. “You will reach the river brink, some sweet day, bye and bye” was her last stanza.

The only qualifications are that you must be over 18 years of age and have a willingness to work hard with a team. The current cost of the trip is \$2000, and some of this can be earned through team fundraisers.

With that being said, we have a fun fundraiser coming up in December. We are hosting a **Christmas Tea Party** on **December 7**. This will be from 1:00 - 4:00 pm. The cost is \$15 per person, and this includes a pot of tea or lemonade, scones, finger sandwiches, and dessert. Young Adult Ministry


Hello, South Church!

Our youth have had a busy September. One of the highlights was a trip we took to UConn's main campus in Storrs. For many of our youth, this was the first time they had ever stepped foot on the school's grounds. After we stopped at the renowned UConn Dairy Bar for ice cream, we took a driving tour of the school, passing by academic buildings and even Gampel Pavilion, where the UConn basketball teams play. I pray that visiting our state's public university left a mark, however small, on each student, giving them a vision of things they can accomplish after they leave our youth group.

Our other big trip was to Ikea in New Haven. Ikea is a Swedish furniture store that has chic furniture at affordable prices. One of the other draws for the store is that they have a cafeteria that sells inexpensive food, including their famous Swedish Meatballs. While at the furniture store, our youth went shopping to renovate the youth center, selecting two black (and comfortable) couches, two new wooden tables, and three spinning stools. A Statement of Faith

Every year at this time, our Church Council works hard to present to you a budget for the upcoming twelve months. The hard truth is that here at South Congregational Church, we have all been living on the blessings of faithful servants who have gone before us. If it were not for the monies they left for us, South Church would have closed its doors some thirty-plus years ago.

The Bible has over one hundred verses that refer to the obligation of all believers to give. How much the church may have already is inconsequential. God is interested not in what others gave yesterday. He wants to see what each of us will do today. The most recent national surveys of American churches indicates churchgoers give an average of \$20.00/week (\$1,040/year). How much you can give, however, is between you and God. **“Give in proportion to what you have. Whatever you give is acceptable if you give it eagerly. And give according to what you have, not what you don't have”** (2 Corinthians 8:11-12).

During this season, we will all spend money on Halloween candy, costumes, and parties. We will fill our dining room tables with turkey, stuffing, cranberry sauce, and a variety of pies. (I do love sugar-free pie!) At Christmas time we will spend generously on gifts for our families, friends, teachers and co-workers. We will buy trees, clothing, decorations, and food. By the time the new year arrives, the average American will spend more in two months (without giving it a second thought) than they give to their church all year. I wonder what Jesus thinks about that.

As we celebrate our 350th anniversary in 2020, I ask everyone to pray about their financial giving. 


